| 09:30 | Visit to the Memorial to the Murdered Jews of Europe The Memorial to the Murdered Jews of Europe in the center of Berlin is the Holocaust memorial for Germany. From 2003 to spring 2005, the memorial was built in the middle of Berlin. It was designed by Peter Eisenmann. The memorial consists of a Field of Stelae covering an area of 19,000 sq m and containing 2,711 concrete blocks in parallel rows, which are tilted by 0.5° to 2°. The memorial and its underground Information Center were inaugurated in 2005 during a special ceremony. |

- The Memorial to the Homosexuals Persecuted under the National Socialist Regime was designed by artists Michael Elmgreen and Ingar Dragset and opened in 2008. The artists have adopted the formal language of the Holocaust Memorial, adding an element: through a small square window the spectator can see a film depicting a kiss. It serves both as a memorial to the homosexual victims of National Socialism and as "a lasting symbol against exclusion, intolerance and animosity towards gays and lesbians".

- The Reichstag building has been the seat of the German Bundestag since 1999. Built in the late 19th century as parliament building of the German Reich, it looks back on an eventful history: the Weimar Republic, the Reichstag fire of 1933, heavy destruction during World War II, reconstruction in the 1950's and 1960's, as well as a complete modernization during the 1990's. The glass dome designed by Norman Foster has become a major tourist attraction and a symbol of Berlin.

 Opening of the exhibition of the drafts for the future monument to the first homosexual emancipation movement
- Starting November 5, 2015, the Lesbian and Gay Association of Berlin and Brandenburg and the Berlin University of the Arts will show the designs for the future monument to the first homosexual emancipation movement in Berlin's Haus der Kulturen der Welt. Berlin was the starting point of the world's first homosexual movement. The Wissenschaftlich-humanitäres Komitee (Scientific Humanitarian Committee) was established here in 1897. Courageous women and men around sexologist Dr. Magnus Hirschfeld created a social and political movement with the aim to fight for rights that would allow lesbians and gays to lead a life free of state persecution and ostracism. Hirschfeld's work had a worldwide impact in favor of the abolition of homophobic legislation. This first homosexual movement will now be honored with a monument which will be inaugurated in summer 2016.

With the exhibition "Homosexuality_ies", the Deutsches Historisches Museum and the Schwules Museum* present the first comprehensive show on the history, politics and culture of homosexuality. Covering a total area of 1600 square meters, the show addresses society's handling of homosexuality in light of social, legal and scientific repression. It follows the gradual process of emancipation from the late 18th century into the present. Jointly funded by the Kulturstiftung des Bundes and the Kulturstiftung der Länder, "Homosexuality_ies" will be on view at the Deutsches Historisches Museum and the Schwules Museum* simultaneously from June 26 to December 1, 2015. Given the ongoing, worldwide discourse on equal rights for homosexuals, both institutions see this exhibition as an act that positions a socially and politically current topic at the center of society.

The Tactical Technology Collective is an international organization dedicated to the use of information in activism. Security in-a-box was first created in 2009 by Tactical Technology Collective and Front Line Defenders, to meet the digital security and privacy needs of human rights defenders. Since then, the website has been updated and expanded to keep up to date with a rapidly-changing digital environment.

Security in-a-box was created by a diverse team of experts who understand not only the conditions under which advocates work, but also the resource restrictions they face. It is basically a toolkit designed primarily to address the growing needs of advocates in the global South - particularly human rights defenders, but the software guides and security strategies in the toolkit are relevant to everyone; specifically people working with sensitive information. This may include vulnerable minorities, independent journalists or whistleblowers, as well as advocates working on a range of issues, from environmental justice to anti-corruption.
